Description	<p>The issue of the role of ICTs in the various dimensions of national Development has long been considered a significant area of IS research that has attracted the interests of IS researchers at several European universities as well as other universities in developed and developing economies. In the past ten years, the access, use and innovations in ICTs to bring people in the remotest and poorest parts of the world as active participants in the global economy, has made the study of ICTs for Development an important means of understanding how improvements in people's live may or may not take place though IS implementations. Further in parallel with this increased access & use of ICTs has been the increasing occurrence of natural disasters due to climate disturbance, major healthcare crises, and civil wars that pose significant threats to the stability and self-determination agendas of developing countries & communities.
